Commentary

During the past 30 years six temporary international criminal tribunals were established: the International Criminal Tribunals for the former Yugoslavia and for Rwanda, the Special Court for Sierra Leone, the Extraordinary Chambers in the Court of Cambodia, the Special Tribunal for Lebanon, and the Kosovo Specialist Chambers. All of these, except the Kosovo court, have closed or are closing. All have created massive bodies of records which are important to future understandings of the conflicts and the development of international justice. Additionally, these records are integral parts of the national history of the countries concerned, reflecting the struggles endured by local populations. Proper preservation of this information is crucial for memorialization processes and ensuring that future generations can learn from these historical Events.

Yet the future of the records of these courts is uncertain. Four (Yugoslavia, Sierra Leone, Lebanon, and Kosovo) are stored in various spaces in The Hague; the Rwanda court records are in Arusha, Tanzania, and the Cambodian records are in Phnom Penh. No long-term archival solution is in place. While the UN archives is the obvious place for archival custody, the UN in New York has no facility constructed to house complex archives, a small staff, and little experience in handling the records of courts, prosecutors, and investigators which have continuing legal demands. In recent years, again without a long-term archival solution, the UN has created new institutions tasked to collect information, like the International, Impartial and Independent Mechanism for Syria and the OHCHR Accountability Project for Sri Lanka to support ongoing and future justice processes.

A durable solution to the preservation of and access to these records is urgently needed. As professional archivists and lawyers dealing with past violations of human rights and humanitarian law, only with a firm, and sustainable administration of the archives can we ensure their availability to support the future right to justice for those deeply affected by the conflicts. The management of these records, whatever the creating entity, should have a common preservation and access framework to make the preservation and management of these records both effective and cost efficient. This is a responsibility that the international community, which created these bodies, must undertake.

The International Council on Archives and swisspeace, a Swiss NGO, arranged a side event on the issue at the Human Rights Council meeting in September 2024. A panel, chaired by ICA President Josée Kirps and including UN archivist Stephen Haufek, discussed need for a framework mechanism for the records of the temporary international criminal courts and, possibly, the institutions that have been tasked to collect information in anticipation of future justice initiatives. Archivist Trudy Peterson, speaking for the panelists, called upon UN Secretary-General António Guterres and UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Türk to establish a working group to develop a robust solution to this looming, serious international problem (see the recording of the session at https://www.ica.org/key-insights-from-the-un-side-event-on-preserving-and-accessing-records-of-temporary-international-criminal-courts/). At the time of this writing, no response had been received. Archivists with contacts in their foreign ministries are encouraged to inform their officials of this initiative and support the establishment of a working group. The preservation of these significant court records deserves attention.
