Commentary

This month, we focus on recent developments in the United States, highlighting threats to privacy and the historical record that impact humanitarian aid, research and development, public health, classified intelligence, and archives. Although SAHR typically avoids letting any single country dominate our news collection, we've included an expanded selection of articles this month to comprehensively document the Trump administration's actions.

Here's a roundup of the big stories, by government office:

- **Department of Agriculture (USDA):** Trump ordered USDA to <u>take down websites that</u> <u>reference the climate crisis</u>, followed shortly by <u>farmers suing over deletion of climate data</u> from government websites.
- Department of Health and Human Services (HHS): the Trump administration is seeking
 access to a database of immigrant minors, CDC web pages have gone dark as Trump targets
 public health information, and top Social Security official exits after clash with Musk's DOGE
 over data.
- **Department of Justice (DOJ):** <u>video evidence</u> of January 6 Capitol attack is missing from the DOJ website.

- Environmental Protection Agency (EPA): Trump is gutting environmental data, removing climate data from public websites, obscuring climate and pollution risks to the public and removing access to the Council on Environmental Quality's Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool. As the Trump administration purges climate data and web pages, environmental researchers are uploading backups.
- **Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD):** DOGE gains access to confidential records on housing discrimination, medical details, and domestic violence
- **National Archives and Records Administration (NARA):** the White House is <u>forcing out top</u> <u>leadership at the National Archives</u> in a major shakeup.
- **Treasury Department:** the IRS reportedly was preparing to give Musk's Doge agency access to taxpayer data, but a judge temporarily blocked the access.
- U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID): senior officials were put on leave after denying access to Musk's Doge team.

<u>Conflicts over access to Americans' personal data</u> are emerging across the federal government, and there are a number of groups and institutions working to preserve the federal record, such as the <u>Data Rescue Project</u>, <u>Harvard University's Law Library</u>, the <u>Public Environmental Data Partners</u>, and the <u>Preservation of Electronic Government Information project</u>.
